Crisis Intervention Capabilities Come to EOC

FCEM Staff are receiving training on how to handle people that are experiencing a heightened emotional states.

Disasters are stressful times for everyone involved. They can cause people to act irrationally and be much more difficult to reason with. It can also exacerbate any underlying mental or emotional conditions a person may have. It is important for all those in emergency response fields to understand how to communicate with people who may be unable to think rationally.

At the generous invitation of the Franklin County Sheriff's Office, SPN Coordinator Josh Preiser attended the week long Crisis Intervention Training. This course covers everything from handling people with mental handicaps such as autism and dementia to those under the influence of drugs.

Additional staff members will be attending future classes so that the entirety of the EOC has this essential skillset to better serve the people of Franklin County.

Tim Keith-Lucas is a retired college professor with a Ph.D. from Duke University. He taught experimental psychology with research in lemur behavior at Suwanee: the University of the South and directed the Island Ecology Program on St. Catherine's Island, Georgia.

Holding Out Until Help Arrives.

Emergency Services may not always be able to immediately respond after a disaster.

After a disaster strikes the county may face significant damage to infrastructure. Roads may be blocked be trees or washed out entirely. Grocery stores may be closed or destroyed. Electronic payment methods may be nonfunctional. It is important for residents to prepare for this worst case scenario.

It is recommended that residents keep these factors in mind when planning for a disaster. Maintain a supply of food and water for your family. A period of three days is a good standard to use when maintaining this supply. Keep cash on hand as well. As mentioned before, electronic payment methods may be offline, so debit and credit cards may not work after a storm.
