<u>National Weather Service to</u> <u>Introduce New Forecast Cone</u>

New and improved forecast product will debut in August, 2024.

A long time staple of Hurricane Season, the National Hurricane Center's (NHC) forecast "cone of uncertainty" is relied upon by millions of Americans throughout the region. This oft misunderstood graphic relays information regarding the potential tracks of the storm, as well as the areas under tropical watches and warnings. At least, it shows most of the areas under watches and warnings.

As it currently stands, the forecast cone only shows coastal areas under these warnings. This can cause people to misunderstand and underestimate the extent of the areas expected to be impacted by the storm. To address this, the NHC will begin depicting all areas under tropical watches and warnings on the forecast cone product. Expected to be in use this August, it is anticipated to provide greater situational awareness to those in the path of the storm.

Fortunately, the National Weather Service has a network of sensors across the country to do exactly that. This real time data shows the current and past water levels for a given location. It even shows the various flood stages unique to that site.

Many people feel the urge to help their fellow man after a disaster, but not all know how to do so in a manner that actually contributes. There are some important things to remember when looking to volunteer:

- Cash: Financial support to established relief organizations is always the most immediate, useful, and versatile way to give. Financial assistance allows relief organizations to meet urgent needs quickly.
- Confirm: Confirm there is a need before collecting or sending donated items. Volunteer Florida encourages cash donations to disaster relief organizations.
- Connect: Volunteers are a critical part of a well-coordinated and wellresourced humanitarian response, but potential volunteers should confirm that they are needed before traveling to impacted areas – do not selfdeploy.

EOC Tip of the Week



Sandbag Usage Ensure that you use these assets correctly, and understand their limitations

- Fill the sandbag one half full
- If the sandbags are unsupported, limit them to three layers high
- Tamp each sandbag down to help it fill any gaps
- Remember the following limitations:
 - Sandbags will not seal out water
 - They can deteriorate quickly if exposed to repeated wetting and drying
 - Wet sandbags are very heavy and should be handled with caution to avoid injury
 - Sandbags are meant only for protection from small water flow and are not suitable for major flooding events
