Hurricane Season Approaches


Are you prepared for this most wonderful time of year?

This leaves a month to prepare for possible storms hitting Franklin County this year.

New Weather Monitoring Stations Begin Broadcasting

The long awaited WeatherSTEM stations are coming online this week.

For the last several months the staff of FCEM have been coordinating the installation of three new weather monitoring stations with a company called WeatherSTEM. There are already several stations scattered about the county, and this week the fruits of our labor are realized. The station installed at the Alligator Point Fire Department is already online, and the stations on Dog Island and Saint George Island will go online later this week.

FCEM would like to thank Luke Hunnewell of WeatherSTEM for his efforts to expand coverage in the county, Randy Canon of the Dog Island Volunteer Fire Department who proved indispensable with the installation of the Dog Island station, Charlie Wood of FWC who transported materials to Dog Island, and Mitch McCalpin and the Franklin County Road Department who installed the pole for the station on Saint George Island.
