

<u>Identifying Essential Documents to Secure During an Evacuation</u>

Disasters often strike suddenly, underscoring the importance of taking preventive steps to ensure your family's safety. One crucial aspect is understanding which documents should be protected. There are two primary storage methods to consider:

- Physical storage options involve a portable fire-resistant/water-resistant bag, a binder with plastic sleeves, or a double-bagged Ziploc bag.
- Electronic storage options include email, thumb/external hard drive, phone or computer, or cloud storage.

Essential documents to have on hand include Driver's License, Military ID, Birth certificates, Passports, Social Security Cards, Adoption Paperwork, vital medical records, property documents with insurance details, financial information (such as online banking credentials), and any significant legal, personal, or family records like cherished photos and letters.

In addition to storing these vital documents, it's also essential to keep them organized and easily accessible. Here are a few tips to help you manage your important records effectively:

- 1.**Create a Checklist**
- 2.**Label and Categorize**
- 3.**Backup Regularly**
- 4. **Secure Access**
- 5.**Inform Family Members**
- 6.**Emergency Binder**

By taking these steps, you can ensure that you and your loved ones are better prepared to handle any unforeseen events with confidence and peace of mind. Remember, the goal is not only to protect these documents but also to make sure they are accessible when you need them most.

<u>Having a Plan B when in</u> <u>Tate's Hell</u>

- 1. Let someone know where you are going and when you are going to return.
- 2. Carry the most essential rescue items in your kit, a butane lighter. (Starting a small contained fire will help get you rescued.)
- 3. Protect yourself. Carry water, closed-toe shoes, insect repellent, sunscreen, and a hat.
- 4. Communicate. Lots of Tate's Hell is outside cell phone coverage, but a satellite communicator, such as those made by Garmin and Save Me Spot, will let you call for help anywhere in the world.
