

Getting Your Home Ready for a Storm

The key precaution to minimize damage to your home and belongings is to secure areas vulnerable to wind infiltration. Recent research in wind technology emphasizes the significance of fortifying the exterior of your home to prevent large openings from forming due to wind and debris. Focus on safeguarding and strengthening these five crucial areas: Roof, Straps, Windows, Doors, and Garage Doors. Ensuring that your roof is in top



condition is paramount. Regular inspections and maintenance can help identify weak spots or loose shingles that may become hazards during high winds. Consider installing wind-resistant shingles and using roofing adhesives to provide additional security. Straps, also known as hurricane ties, are essential in connecting the roof to the walls of your house. These metal connectors help prevent the roof from lifting off during severe wind events. Make sure they are properly installed and maintained to enhance the structural integrity of your home. Windows are another critical area that requires attention. Impact-resistant windows or storm shutters can significantly reduce the risk of breakage from flying debris. In the absence of these, boarding up windows with plywood before a storm can provide a temporary but effective solution. Doors, particularly entry and patio doors, should be checked for robustness. Reinforce them with sturdy bolts and deadlocks. Consider upgrading to impactresistant doors which provide better protection against high winds and debris. Garage doors are often the largest opening in a home and can be particularly susceptible to wind damage. Ensure that your garage door is wind-rated and consider installing a bracing kit to provide additional support. By focusing on these five key areas, you can greatly enhance the resilience of your home against wind damage. Additionally, it is wise to develop an emergency plan and keep essential supplies on hand to ensure safety and preparedness in the event of severe weather. Taking these steps not only protects your property but also ensures the safety and peace of mind for you and your loved ones.

Some additional steps to get your home ready for a storm; Clean gutters: Before storm season, clear out debris from gutters to ensure proper water drainage. Trim trees: Prune trees and shrubs to enhance their resilience during a storm and safeguard your home from potential debris. Prepare an emergency kit: Assemble a kit containing essentials that can sustain your family for 72 hours. Plan evacuation: Determine the evacuation procedure, timing, and necessary items to take with you. Install storm shutters: Fix shutters to your windows for quick deployment when a storm is imminent. Protect windows and doors: If storm shutters are unavailable, shield windows and doors with plywood. Secure loose items: Check and secure any loose objects that could become hazardous during a storm. Fill tubs and freeze water: Keep water stored in bathtubs to use in emergencies. Plan for pets: Ensure you have a plan in place to safely evacuate your pets. Other things you can do include: sandbagging, turning off utilities, having a battery-operated radio, and staying informed.

Prepping Your Yard before a Storm



Preparing your landscape for the hurricane season in Florida to withstand heavy rains and high winds is paramount. Prepping for Storm Surge

Storm surge, associated with tropical cyclones, is an abnormal rise of water. It is not a massive wall of water but a gradual, swift water level increase along coastlines and rivers. Though you cannot prevent a storm surge, you can minimize damage to protect your home and its occupants. Here are steps to prepare for a storm surge: Determine the Base Flood Elevation (BFE) for your home, which indicates the expected floodwater level during a 1%-annual-



chance event. Outdoor preparations include elevating your home, reinforcing the garage door, securing windows and doors, safeguarding manufactured homes, securing outdoor items, trimming or removing trees, sealing cracks, and anchoring fuel tanks and utility connections. Indoor preparations involve creating a plan, obtaining flood insurance, listing home contents, storing valuables, elevating appliances above the BFE, using flood-resistant materials, and familiarizing yourself with your property and neighborhood. Evacuation planning is crucial. Know your community's evacuation routes and have a plan for where you will go. Make sure all family members are aware of the plan and practice it regularly.

By taking these proactive steps, you can enhance your resilience against storm surges and protect your home, belongings, and loved ones. Remember, preparation is key to weathering the storm safely and effectively.
